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

History of the Dacotah Prairie Museum

The idea for a Museum in Aberdeen originated in 1938 when John Murphy, a Northern State College professor, and Marc Cleworth, a salesman, created the Northern South Dakota History Museum, which was housed in the Central building on Northern's campus.

This Museum closed in 1941 when space was needed on campus to train WWII glider pilots. The nearly 500 artifacts collected were either returned to donors or placed in storage where they remained until 1970 when they were added to the collection of the new Dacotah Prairie Museum.

A New Museum is Born

The idea of a Museum resurfaced in 1963 when a group of past presidents of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) met to consider possible community projects for the group. By 1964 the AAUW committee, along with representatives of other community groups, had chosen a Museum as their project and had begun looking for possible sites.

In April 1968, the Aberdeen Parks and Recreation Department offered the Anderson Recreation Center (now Senior Center) as a temporary home for a Museum. The Museum's board of directors accepted the offer and, in 1969 opened the Dacotah Prairie Museum, but the search for a permanent site continued.

The Museum Finds a Home

On March 11, 1970, Fred Hatterscheidt, a local businessman, offered the building at 21 South Main to the County for use as a Museum. The County Commissioners accepted the offer and by mid-

summer renovations to the building began.



On October 25, 1970, the Dacotah Prairie Museum opened the doors of its new home to the public. Governor Frank Farrar spoke at

the opening ceremony.

In 1970 the Museum's exhibit area included only portions of the first floor, as it shared the building with several other tenants. As the decade progressed, the Museum expanded its exhibit space to the entire

first floor and half of the second. By 1980 the Dacotah Prairie Museum occupied the entire building. Staff and volunteers worked to ready new found spaces to accommodate staff, exhibits and collection storage.

The 1980s and 1990s

During the 1980s and 1990s the Museum continued to define itself. A mission statement was adopted, and policies of operation were put into place. Staff numbers increased, as did the Museum's tax-supported budget. The Dacotah Prairie Museum Foundation was incorporated in 1985 to assist the Museum in raising outside funds to supplement the annual budget.

During these two decades, several professional assessments were conducted to help the Museum improve its collection management methods, maintain the integrity of its historic building, and strengthen its overall operations.

2000 and Beyond

Renovations to the building's exterior and its major first floor gallery spaces were the focus of work during the early years of this period. The feasibility of an expansion project to double DPM's size was explored in 2007—2008. Despite a posi-

tive response from the community, a down-turned economy post-poned action on the project. To compensate, upgrades to exist-



ing spaces were made to maximize their effectiveness.

Unexpected New Space

In 2012 John Sieh, founder and owner of the Granary Rural Cultural Center, donated the Granary to DPM/Brown County. DPM utilizes the 2.3 acre facility from April—October for a variety of art and heritage related activities for audiences of all ages and interests.

Every Museum strives to create programs and exhibits that inspire curiosity, stimulate conversation, and encourage further investigation. DPM, being no exception, works hard to keep Brown County stories relevant and interesting to today's population by using creative yet thoughtful methods.

For example, an exhibit about the Vietnam War was created to coordinate with South Dakota Public Broadcasting's local screening of its trailer for Ken Burns' expansive documentary about the war broadcast on PBS in the fall of 2017. The stories of local Vietnam veterans became the focus of conversation and learning for new generations who are far removed from that war.

Young visitors learned about some of our county's earliest businesses in the annual children's exhibits. Learning/playing stations throughout this exhibit allowed children to be train masters, bankers, land agents, or postal workers using props inspired by artifacts in the DPM collection.

Area artists showcased creations in a wide variety of media that encouraged audiences to remember and discuss familiar spaces and places or simply enjoy a brief moment of peace and calm in their busy lives.

Students of all ages enjoyed learning local history through the numerous programs DPM staff delivered in classrooms, at the Museum, or at summer camps, which provided active learning situations where students could learn by doing, not simply by listening.

Details of all DPM activities can be found later in this report.

The DPM staff sincerely hopes their efforts during 2017 have provided pleasure in some manner to those it serves.

Facility Improvements

New light filtering roller shades replaced the 1980s era Mylar shades on eleven second and third story windows to better protect the exhibit and collection areas from light and UV damage. These blinds offer differing light diffusing levels depending on where they were installed. The Lamont Gallery shades offer UV filtering with a high degree of light penetration to allow natural lighting into the gallery while the shade near the Gage Parlor eliminates outside light penetration, which minimizes the glare that light created on the exhibit glass and make exhibit viewing easier.

The second phase of drapery removal on the third floor was completed, and new wood blinds were installed on the windows in the library and on the landing. Now all second and third floor windows have new decorative yet protective coverings.

Additional shelves were built in the art storage area off the Lamont Gallery to house DPM's ever-growing collection of prints and paintings.

High winds dislodged the southern most awning on the Main Street side of the building on November 20, damaging the fabric and frame extensively. A new awning was created and installed.

Personnel Notes

Lora Schaunaman, Patricia Kendall, and Marianne Klipfel attended the South Dakota Association of Museums annual meeting in Deadwood. Lora represents DPM on the association's board of directors. This organization selected Sue Gates to receive its award for outstanding institutional leadership.

Shannon Imberi-O'Keefe and Lee Schinkel were appointed to the DPM Board of Directors while JoAnne Barry and Molly Dahme joined the board of the DPM Foundation.

Several people joined DPM's active volunteer corps as educational leaders and receptionists.

Granary Activities

The 2017 Granary season included art, theater, music, and historic exhibits designed to provide visitors many opportunities for learning and fun in a quiet, rural setting. The annual high school art show attracted students from North and South Dakota who enjoyed keynote speaker Bryan Schultz from Aberdeen Community Theater, and seminars by artists Nick and Nicole Fischer, Thom Berg, and Ruth Wegehaupt. Jay Hopkins and McCal Johnson served as judges who not only selected art show winners but also provided feedback on each piece in the show to help the student artists improve their craft.

A new attraction this season was a visit by the Storybook Land Theater Troupe from Aberdeen whose members performed "Junie B. Jones, the Musical" for an enthusiastic audience of kids and adults from Aberdeen and the surrounding area. A new activity in the form of a heritage activity camp was developed and shared with students from the Roncalli Sonshine Patch. Using the feedback from campers and parents, staff will determine if this activity should be a permanent offering of the Granary.

Lora Schaunaman, curator or exhibits and professional artist, led several sessions of art camp for area children. This activity is perennially popular.

Artists, both amateur and professional, were invited to provide pieces for the first annual "Create! On the Prairie" show in the Granary Gallery. About two dozen artists using widely differing media participated. DPM purchased a pastel painting of "Dane" by Angela Schmitz from this show for its permanent art collection.

Artists were also invited to participated in a Plein Air event in conjunction with the Living History Fall Festival. Those participating spent two days painting scenes they found attractive in a ten mile radius of the Granary. The finished pieces were on display and available for sale at the end of the Festival.

The seasonal exhibit in Putney Hall outlined

the history of the apron and featured aprons from the DPM collection. NSU student intern, JoAnn Jernberg, researched and helped design and install this interesting display.

An old fashioned ice cream social was held in July to celebrate National Ice Cream Day. The event featured live music and homemade ice cream.

The final event of the season was the Living History Fall Festival featuring Arch Ellwein portraying Theodore Roosevelt and lunch by the Brass Kettle restaurant. Unfortunately, the day was cold and rainy, which discouraged many from attending. However, those that came enjoyed square dance demonstrations, a spelling bee, historic hands-on activities and lots of good food in addition to two performances by Mr. Ellwein.

Andrew Jones was hired to mow the grounds and do some much needed thinning of trees and shrubbery. He and his crew made significant strides in recapturing the natural beauty of the campus in preparation for new plantings of prairie flowers and grasses.

DPM staff developed a plan to promote the Granary facility as a site for weddings. A brochure detailing the site's offerings was created. Staff also had a booth at the Bridal Showcase held at the Dakota Event Center in November.

The Granary is supported financially by Brown County as part of the DPM budget with addition funding for programming provided by the Dacotah Prairie Museum Foundation as well as the 3-M Corporation who awarded the Granary a \$3,000 community vibrancy grant to support the 2018 All Dakota High School Fine Arts Exhibition.

THE GRANARY

Education Department

Connecting people with history is the force behind the efforts of staff in this department. Visits to classrooms and senior living centers, in house tours and special activities, and camps with a variety of themes are the tools used to make these connections happen.

During the 2017 calendar year, a total of 9,410 students were touched through the 396 visits DPM staff made to local and area classrooms. Nearly 175 youngsters attended History Camp while another 600 or so third graders enjoyed the Afternoon into the Past program at the Museum. Nearly 1,200 adults either toured the Museum or hosted staff who provided programs. The always popular children's exhibits drew students from nine local pre-schools and 28 elementary classes.

Heritage Arts Festival featured four folk artists (Starr Chief Eagle, hoop dancer; Dan Higgins, leather worker; Michael McDonald, folk singer; and Annikki Marttila, fiber arts/weaver) who shared their talents with 170 students from four local schools.

Staff also prepared and presented programs to a variety of organizations including the Northeast Region Hospital Auxiliary, the Sons of Norway, the Westerners, and P.E.O.

The students from the Roncalli six grade are trained by department staff to assist with much of this programming. During the 2016-2017 school year these Junior Docents contributed 273.5 hours of their time to DPM. This was the 24th year for this successful youth volunteer program.



Aberdeen hosted South Dakota's 71st annual Snow Queen Festival, and during the festivities Georgialee Quail was selected to be the 2017 Snow Queen. The queen contestants visited the Mu-

seum for a tour and enjoyed a Q&A game of Snow Queen trivia and viewing items from past festivals featured in this exhibit.

"My Vision in Watercolor"

(February 10 - May 20)

This was Sisseton artist Rosemarie Hanssen's first show in Aberdeen, and it included some of the landscapes, florals, and still-life paintings that have become her trademark media over the years. Her watercolors glowed with rich color schemes and prairie subjects.







"Vintage Architecture"

(June 1 - September 1)

This show by Phoebe Dawn, a recent NSU Art Department graduate, featured her watercolor paintings and pen/ink drawings of many Brown County historic buildings. She turned these structures into ar-





tistic images through her use of unique angles and unusual perspectives to draw attention to their distinctive architecture.

"View from My South Dakota Home"

(September 9 – November 14)

This was the first public exhibit for 80 year old Mickie L. Hansen of Faulkton, SD. and a retrospect of her lengthy career as a painter. The oldest piece in this show was painted in 1978, and the newest was completed only two weeks before the show opened. Her fascinating people, places and buildings evoked the feeling of having recently travelled through America's Heartland.

The Lamont Gallery

"Frontier Main Street" (February 11- April 30)



DPM's annual Children's Exhibit looked at Brown County life from 1880-1910 and examined what businesses existed and how they worked.



The Aberdeen Land Office, the Hecla Bank, Frederick's Tailor Shop, the dining room in the Alonzo Ward Hotel, and Aberdeen's Ward Owsley Candy Company were a few of the businesses recreated in this gallery with fun, hands-on play and learning opportunities at each station.

"Horsehair Pottery – Dakota Style" (May 27 – September 17)

Kimball, S.D., artist, Deb Burckhard shared her unique style of pottery in this show. Each piece featured stunning colors, beautiful imagery and a carbon trail created when horsehair is placed on the hot pottery, which has just come out of the kiln. When the hair burns away, it leaves the intricate and delicate black carbon markings.





"Kaleidoscope Capers" (September 30 - November 30)

Collette Gesinger, a former Aberdeen art teacher who now lives in Sioux Falls, uses ink resist paintings fired onto porcelain tiles to create pieces featuring vibrant colors and free-form composition.





"Trail Dust & Sentiment" (December 12 - February 16)

Fargo artist and photographer Sabrina Hornung develops her own photographs in an early cyanotype method. She combines her paintings, photographs, and cut images into collages for the mixed media pieces featured in this show, which also included several pieces of "Scherenschnitte" or traditional German paper-cutting.








Prairie Landing Gallery

"The Vietnam War Experience"

(July 22 - November 12)

This special request exhibit turned into the most successful surprise of the year in many ways. SDPB asked DPM to create an exhibit to coincide with the broadcast of Ken Burns' documentary on Vietnam. Chal-



lenged by a lack of artifacts, staff worked with local veteran's organizations who made our needs known to their members who ultimately provided uniforms and other memorabilia from the era. The resultant exhibit filled this space and the Helen Bergh Education Room.

"Vintage Christmas Attire"

(November 18 - December 27)

The Victorians truly knew how to dress for the Holidays and for every special occasion. This exhibit spotlighted DPM's exquisite collection of clothing and accessories, including tuxedos, vests, spats, canes, top hats and pocket watches for the well-dressed gentleman. The ladies would have been decked out in velvet gowns, furs, plumed hats and jewels fit for a princess. This exhibit celebrated the more capricious side of dressing for the holiday festivities.

"Tonight's Dreams are Tomorrow's Memories" (January 5 -January 25)

The official Show Queen portraits and festival memorabilia from past events filled this gallery to tell the story of this Aberdeen event.



"Frontier Main Street" (February 10—April 30)

Visitors to this portion of the children's exhibits could be a train master or passenger, sort mail, and place decorations on the Grain Palace exterior as part of the early Aberdeen/Brown County business theme of the display.



"The Vietnam War Experience" (July 22—November 12)

DPM partnered with South Dakota Public Broadcasting to create an exhibit about the Vietnam War as experienced by our local veterans. This was in conjunction with PBS' broadcast of Ken Burns' Vietnam documentary.

Local veterans were very generous with their artifacts, so we were able to fill the education room as well as the landing area. Components of this exhibit were used in a small exhibit at the Capitol Theater during a special screening of a segment of the film.



Christmas Tree Lane (November 18—December 28)

The theme for this annual holiday exhibit was "Holiday Traditions." As always, the clubs, organizations, and individuals provided beautifully decorated trees for all to enjoy.

Collection Department

DPM's Collection is the heart of the Museum as collection pieces are used to build programs and exhibits. Therefore it is vital that the collection staff knows what is in the collection and where those items are located. Staff also knows what new items would fill gaps in the existing collection and is prepared to accept or reject items offered based solely on the needs of the collection.

Several interesting pieces were added during 2017 including: Twenty-four Santa Bears issued annually by the Dayton/Hudson stores; an ostrich egg from a 1978 African safari, many pieces to be added to both the Snow Queen and Aberdeen Pheasant collections; and items from local businesses and organizations.



Work in the archives included photographing, filing, and completing the accession process on most pieces while removing items unrelated to Brown County history. Transcribing oral history recordings to make the information available in a digital format is an ongoing project as is working to process the backlog of historic photographs.

Nearly 270 artifacts were added to the collection by 56 donors. Information on 724 artifacts was added to the Past Perfect collection. At year's end, information on 32,394 artifacts was available in this program.

Miscellaneous tasks including reorganizing the textile file, troubleshooting issues in the accession records, and retrieving artifacts for use by other staff were also accomplished.

DPM selects pieces from featured art exhibits to add to its collection each year.


