

# **DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE**

### A Year Like No Other

"How to Weather A Pandemic" (see page 20) was not on our bingo card for 2020. The year started out great, with higher than average attendance in January, February and right up to mid-March. We had a surprisingly high attendance in January, usually a quiet month. A visit from South Dakota Public Broadcasting's "Science Steve" in February and our live-action character event, "History Alive!" in March bumped up our numbers significantly. Even the weather in early March was favorable. And then... well, March 13th was the last day the Dacotah Prairie Museum was open before closing for nearly four months during the global COVID19 pandemic.

# **Changing Lanes**

We reopened to a new "normal" on Wednesday, July 8. As a county-supported museum, we had a safety net that we did not take for granted. We also did not sit around and wring our hands. We immediately switched lanes and got to work reaching our museum families, patrons and community. In normal times, a museum staff never has idle time on their hands as they are always planning ahead and moving forward. Exhibits do not magically appear, fully installed and well-researched; school program visits are scheduled months in advance; and potential artifacts for the collection are continually arriving. At the end of 2020, the museum staff must be commended for modifying their normal tasks while adding virtual events and tours, answering requests for interviews, creating 9 weeks of activity packets for our museum families and reimaging everything about being a museum in service to our community.

# Silver Linings

As you will see in this annual report, there were many silver linings to our 2020 museum year. Our social media output and range has grown by leaps and bounds. We have changed our open hours to be more accommodating to our volunteers during the week and to our patrons on the weekend. Our building feels more secure with new delivery protocols, nanny-cams and doorbells so

that staff can monitor the coming and going of visitors from different parts of the building.

The Museum staff won two awards in 2020: one for our activity packets for Museum families during June and July and a South Dakota Tourism award for hospitality for our retiring Curator of Exhibits, Lora Schaunaman. Even during a pandemic, we are an "Award Winning Museum" (see page 5)!

# **Looking Ahead**

2021 will be a banner year for us. We will have new part-time staff with fresh ideas and bright outlooks, our senior staff will breathe a sigh of relief as things open up for new plans and programs with fewer restrictions.

As a director, my goal will be to continually push forward and keep this historic building in top-notch shape with remodeling plans for the 3rd floor archives and staff workspaces and to refurbish the exterior brickwork on the north and east sides of the building. I also feel that my job is give the staff all of the tools and support they need to accomplish our goals and mission... of telling the stories of the Dakota prairie and its inhabitants.

# The idea for a Museum

...in Aberdeen originated in **1938** when John Murphy, a Northern State College professor, and Marc Cleworth, a salesman, created the Northern South Dakota History Museum, which was housed in the Central building on Northern's campus.

This Museum closed in **1941** when space was needed on campus to train WWII glider pilots. The nearly 500 artifacts collected were either returned to donors or placed in storage where they remained until **1970** when they were added to the collection of the new Dacotah Prairie Museum.

### A New Museum is Born

The idea of a Museum resurfaced in 1963 when a group of past presidents of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) met to consider possible community projects for the group. By **1964** the AAUW committee, along with representatives of other community groups, had chosen a museum as their project and had begun looking for possible sites.

In **April 1968**, the Aberdeen Parks and Recreation Department offered the Anderson Recreation Center (now Senior Center) as a temporary home for a museum. The Museum's board of directors accepted the offer and, in **1969** opened the Dacotah Prairie Museum, but the search for a permanent site continued.

### The Museum Finds a Home

On **March 11, 1970**, Fred Hatterscheidt, a local businessman, offered the building at 21 S. Main to the County for use as a museum. The County Commissioners accepted the offer and by mid-summer renovations to the building began.

On **October 25, 1970**, the Dacotah Prairie Museum opened the doors of its new home to the public. Governor Frank Farrar spoke at the opening ceremony.

In **1970** the Museum's exhibit area included only portions of the first floor, as it shared the building with several other tenants. As the decade progressed, the Museum expanded its exhibit space to the entire first floor and half of the second. By **1980** the Dacotah Prairie Museum occupied the entire building. Staff and volunteers worked to ready new found spaces to accommodate staff, exhibits and collection storage.

#### The 1980s and 1990s

During this time the Museum continued to define itself. A mission statement was adopted, and policies of operation were put into place. Staff numbers increased, as did the Museum's tax-supported budget. The Dacotah Prairie Museum Foundation was incorporated in **1985** to assist the Museum in raising outside funds to supplement the annual budget.

During these two decades, several professional assessments were conducted to help the Museum improve its collection management methods, maintain the integrity of its historic building, and strengthen its overall operations.

#### The 2000s and 2010s

Renovations to the building's exterior and its major first floor gallery spaces were the focus of work during the early years of this period. The feasibility of an expansion project to double DPM's size was explored in **2007** (and again in **2017**). Despite a positive response from the community, a down-turned economy postponed action on the project. To compensate, upgrades to existing spaces were made to maximize their effectiveness.

In **2013** the first floor "Squire Gallery" was renovated with help from the Ka Squire family. It highlights "Opening the Dacotah Frontier" with its full-size Red River cart, fur trading, native Lakota family, Fort Sisseton and fine lady in a carriage vignettes.

In 2016 the former Toy and Fan exhibits gallery was renovated into an open space, removing walls and the "maze" as it was called to create a new space for changing exhibits. Currently, the "Dacotah Prairie Museum: 50 Years and Growing..." anniversary exhibit highlights the history of the DPM. Other updates include all-new LED lights in the majority of the exhibits and common areas at the end of 2019, and the last two skeleton key locks were replaced at the same time. Also in 2019 new bathroom pedestal sinks in the second floor restrooms replaced the mid-century era versions and all of the common areas on first and second floor, including the stairwells, received a fresh coat of paint. In 2020 new vinyl lettering welcomed visitors in the first floor lobby and above the Museum gift shop. Looking sharp for the new decade!

### SPECIAL EVENTS

### SDPB's Science Steve

February 29

South Dakota Public Broadcasting hosted Science Steve at the museum for three hours of science fun. Steve uses humor, watermelons, and flying toilet paper to bring dry theorems and scientific laws to life for kids and adults. Each appearance included approximately 15 science demonstrations on physics, chemistry, anatomy and more.

#### Museum Alive!

March 8

Five costumed actors interacted with visitors in character as historic Brown County figures. Michelle Schaunaman as Matilda Joselyn Gage, Chris Anderson as J. L. W. Zietlow. Tabor Schabot as a railroad station agent, Christina Grettler as Meda Mason, and Jacob Usselman as a WWII soldier.

### **Summer Program for Museum Families**

Every Monday in June and July (9 weeks)

A joint staff venture that produced 9 editions of the History Times with fun activities and Brown County historical stories centered around the buildings at Centennial Village and 9 different art kits with supplies and instructions. Over 1800 packets were handed out to area families to make their summer a little bit more enjoyable.

### **Nicole Philips Book Signing**

September 10

Author of "The Negativity Remedy", Nicole Philips, Aberdeen, spent an afternoon at the museum greeting visitors and personally signing books. The Mercantile gift shop sold the book and promoted the event.

### **Harvest Stroll**

October 3

A "Stroll Around the Block" event to celebrate harvest time in Brown County. Staff offered a variety of stations placed around our historic 1889 building. Patrons enjoyed hot cider and a sugar cookie and took home a fun fall activity project-in-a-bag, and a mini pumpkin. The 2020 All Dakota High School Fine Arts Exhibition was on display in our gallery windows as visitors strolled by our building. Several harvest/seasonal decorated photo op were set up; visitors were encouraged to take photos and share on social media. A holiday raffle of cozy gift items from The Mercantile was available; a basket of cool-weather comforts with a nod to Aberdeen and Brown County history perfect for gift giving and a Melissa & Doug 30" T-Rex plush toy with a gift shop gift card. This was an outdoor event with social distancing; the staff was eager to see museum families and patrons again in person.











# Art Camp Stands Alone

Each summer the Museum hosts hundreds of elementary and middle school aged children at a variety of camps. But in 2020, with Covid concerns, the Museum decided to reduce the camps to just Art Camp with limited attendance. History Camp was deemed too hands-on and filled with a variety of group activities that were not conducive to social distancing.

Centennial Village at the Brown County Fairgrounds was determined to be the best outdoor space for Art Camp with it's open, shady grounds with picnic tables and paved walkway. It also offered an indoor open space in the "Saloon" to socially distance while working on art projects in case of inclement weather.

Campers and parents/guardians were greeted at the entrance to Centennial Village and a smooth system of drop-off and pick-up quickly fell into place.

Campers were given bottled water by staff and no other personal belongings were allowed to reduce any possibility of cross contamination. Hand sanitizing stations were set up for easy access by campers and staff.

### What is Art Camp?

Inspiration awaits! Campers came to historic Centennial Village to be an artist for the morning. There were new themes daily, with two weekly sessions available for many options. Campers registered for one or more days.

Lora Schaunaman curated and taught 8 sessions of a morning-only workshop.

### **EDUCATION**

### Educational impact

The Dacotah Prairie Museum Education Department is a unique and essential part of the learning community in Brown County. As a repository of local history, the staff, Sherri Rawstern, Curator of Education and Mary Locken Baird, Curatorial Assistant, is uniquely qualified to supplement the current state and national requirements. Teachers are provided with detailed and varied programs that fit the elementary curriculum. For instance, the Museum's program on "Homesteading" fits into the South Dakota history requirement.

Key stakeholders who benefit from the DPM's educational programs are teachers, students, parents, school administrators and the general public. Teachers have the advantage of using the DPM as an additional resource in their alreadystrapped budgets as staff bring all the necessary supplies for each visit. Students gain additional knowledge and insights from knowledgeable staff that visit their classrooms and then share with their parents, families and caregivers. School administrators have access to the supplemental learning opportunities provided by the Museum, a county entity. Most of all, the people of Brown County benefit from the Museum's educational programs as students learn about the history of their town, county and state. They gain a connection and understanding to their hometowns. This connection means they will be more committed as adults to understand and protect their community's history and will want to be fully engaged members of society. As an added benefit, these students are enthusiastic about the DPM and can't wait to visit again and again and to bring their families.

The resulting impact of the DPM education programs and staff visits is far reaching. Outcomes are ever generated going forward. They are: Educated citizenry, increased museum patronage, the ability and reputation to bring in outside educational programs from many sources and the reputation of having a robust and meaningful educational impact on the citizens of Brown County.

The Education department has developed several partnerships: the Aberdeen public and private school systems, county schools, and service groups. The DPM's Education Department's reach is far and wide and will continue to provide ongoing benefits for the community and our patrons.

History never gets old or outdated and every year brings a

fresh audience of youth to learn about South Dakota and Brown County history. The Museum staff will be there to bring up the next generation of historians and good community members through our programs.

How did the Education department handle the restrictions placed on school visits during the school year in 2020? YouTube and Zoom! When public and private schools switched to online learning, the Education Department quickly developed a series of "History Moments" videos for YouTube that mimicked the regular education programs the staff took on classroom visits. Video titles included:



## Museum patrons in the making.

The Dacotah Prairie Museum Junior Docent program began in 1993 with the Aberdeen Roncalli sixth grade classes. Docents help the education staff with "Afternoon in the Past" programs at the museum and with classroom visits at all of the Aberdeen schools, both public and private. The docents also choose a museum exhibit to present to visitors during Catholic Education Week each year. Previous docents of all ages, who visit the museum, eagerly tell staff which exhibit was "theirs" and what they remember from that time.

The DPM is generating future museum patrons and supporters through this program. These elementary students will always have a connection to the Museum and to Brown County history. Just to make sure, each student receives a copy of the 1980 Brown County History Book upon completion of the year.

## **COLLECTIONS**

# Every Artifact

The Dacotah Prairie Museum Collections Department touches every artifact that enters the building and ultimately into the collection. A strict vetting process is employed to determine if an object meets the established criteria; it must tell a story about Brown County or a county resident, it must be in good condition, it cannot be a duplicate of an artifact already in the collection (due to space limitations), and it must fit our mission statement. Our Curator of Collections, Jackie Ormand, uses these criteria and a discriminating eye when evaluating new acquisitions.

### 2020 Projects:

Transferred photos of current and past artifacts in collection into PastPerfect (museum catalogue program). Inventoried and photographed archival documents/artifacts (Cabinet "C" in archives). From Cabinet "A"-"C" in Archives, caught up with "R" research numbers (non-accessionable items). Re-arranged archival boxes and changed locations in PastPerfect.

Most of this was done by Jackie while working from home during the Covid situation. She was able to concentrate on archival documents/artifacts which can be moved back and forth easily between the office and home and she used her time at the museum to work on 3-D artifacts.



## **EXHIBITS: IN-HOUSE**

## Curating Art and History

The Dacotah Prairie Museum Exhibits Department produced over 20 in-house exhibits in 9 gallery and display spaces in 2019; ranging from local artists to traveling exhibits to interpretive historical displays. In addition to the rotating exhibit spaces, the Museum currently has 11 semi-permanent gallery spaces that are maintained, updated and otherwise redressed as needed during the year. This keeps the exhibits staff of Lora Schaunaman, Curator and Marianne Marttila-Klipfel, Curatorial Assistant busy all year long.

### **LAMONT GALLERY**

# October 8, 2019 – January 16 "Our Nordic Roots" – Celebration of Our Heritage Series Featuring: (Sweden, Norway, Finland, Denmark, Iceland)

We began the year in the Lamont Gallery with a continuation from 2019 of a very well-received exhibit about Nordic culture and history. Starting with ancient Vikings and including traditional dress, artifacts, and evolving cultures, the exhibit featured items from our collection, augmented by loaned treasures from a dozen patrons. A home scene full of Nordic artifacts filled the east half of the exhibit space.

# February 8 – August 9 "TreeHouses: Look Who's Living in the Trees" Traveling Exhibit from Sciencenter of Ithaca, New York

Components for "TreeHouses: Look Who's Living in the Trees" arrived in a large truck in chilly February, which was the second traveling exhibit from the Sciencenter in Ithaca, NY to grace the halls of Dacotah Prairie Museum. (The first was "Toys: The Inside Story" in 2016.) The exhibit, set up in the Lamont Gallery, Helen Bergh Education Room, and Prairie Landing Gallery spaces, included two accessible tree houses. Visitors were encouraged to "climb" into the tree houses to try out the animal sounds dance floor, peer into animal themed viewfinders, see wildlife specimens, and find tracks and other signs of animals. Technology and hands on activities were utilized to help patrons learn about responsible forestry, construction principles, and products from trees. Substantial volunteer hours were contributed by several individuals to ensure the success of this exciting exhibit, including the heavy lifting of getting the many exhibit parts in and out of the building.

(The museum was closed to the public due to COVID-19 in March until July. Closures around the nation resulted in cancellation of the next venue for the TreeHouse exhibit which was scheduled to leave Aberdeen in May. As a result, TreeHouses was held over to early August.)

# September 1 – November 10 "Stitching Our Story: Prairie Stitchers Chapter of the Embroidery Guild of America"

Over 140 handmade pieces made by members of the Prairie Stitchers Chapter of the Embroidery Guild of America filled the Lamont Gallery and spilled out onto the walls of the adjacent Lamont Annex Gallery in the fall of 2020. The colorful and celebratory show was to be open in conjunction with the Embroidery Guild's regional meeting which was cancelled due to COVID -19. Despite this setback, the exhibit was a triumphant display of intricate beauty and mastery of fiber arts.

### November 20 – Con't to Jan. 31, 2021 "West: A Photography Show by Joshua Vincent" (Andrews)

A colorful compilation of large scale photographs of various places in the western United States, including South Dakota, filled the walls of the Lamont Gallery in November and December. The photographs of natural scenery were captured by the artistic eye of Aberdeen native Joshua Vincent Andrews during his last three years of travels. The artist statement for the show and photos on display conveyed an unmistakable love for the great outdoors, appreciation for the beauty of the natural world, and passion for the art of photography.

# "Rewriting History: Who Am I?" – An Exhibit of Creative Writing by the 6<sup>th</sup> Grade Class of Frederick Area School, Frederick, South Dakota

For the third year in a row, sixth grade students of Frederick Area School participated in an exhibit of creative writing inspired by "unidentified" historic photos from the Museum collection. The imaginative stories featured in the exhibit were written as part of DPM's educational programs in schools.

# September 1 – November 10 "Stitching Our Story: Prairie Stitchers Chapter of the Embroidery Guild of America" (Continued in Lamont Gallery)

The Lamont Annex provided extra wall space needed to accommodate pieces from the Prairie Stitchers show in the Lamont Gallery. The works featured in the Annex worked nicely as an introduction to the larger show in the next room.

### **FIRST FLOOR ELEVATOR LANDING**

# January 1 – January 26 "Enchanted Winter Nights" South Dakota Snow Queen Festival

The annual Snow Queen exhibit, along with an outreach exhibit installed at the ARCC Theatre Lobby, was set up in conjunction with the SD Snow Queen Festival. The exhibit occupied the Dacotah and Prairie Landing Galleries. This year's display in the

Dacotah Gallery featured queen portraits from the decades 1950s to 2020 accompanied by photo collages of historic trends of the times.

# February 11 – May 1 "South Dakota Paintings and Quilts" by Mike and Cindy Sudlow

The exhibit titled "South Dakota Paintings and Quilts" was a collaboration of husband and wife Mike and Cindy Sudlow, with works paired together in a display designed to echo the colors, sights, and sentiment of life on the South Dakota prairie. Quilts made by Cindy were shown alongside paintings created by Mike for an interesting juxtaposition of canvas, paint, pattern, and fabric, merging two separate journeys of self-enrichment and creativity into one overarching theme.

# May 13 – December 31 "It Started with a Brownie..." Photography Show by Laurie Heupel

"It started with a Brownie..." engaged visitors with 21 colorful works of photography printed on glass, which were, by design, meant to catch the vibrancy and play of light on reflective surface for a pleasing effect. Laurie Heupel, who was born and raised in Aberdeen, discovered a love for photography when she was given an old Brownie box camera. Through the years, her career with the National Park Service has afforded her many opportunities to photograph nature in eight different national parks, and at various locations near her home on the east coast. Late in 2012 she began a two year journey of taking at least one photo a day. The resulting photographic memories comprised this unique show. Originally scheduled for a shorter stay, the show was held over until the end of the year due to unforeseen cancellations surrounding the events of 2020.

#### **NEW - SEMI-PERMANENT GALLERY**

# Opened December 20, 2020 "Dacotah Prairie Museum 50 Years and Growing..."

A new semi-permanent exhibit celebrating the 50th Anniversary of Dacotah Prairie Museum opened on December 20, 2020 in the former football exhibit space. The display features many aspects of the institution's history with features on early advocates for the Museum, the Museum's different departments, recent donations to the collection, notable artifacts including an original painting by Harvey Dunn, and a scale model of the DPM building handmade by Randy Pfutzenreuter. A hands-on feature with rotating boxes shares interesting details about 12 different artifacts from the collection and a button-activated audio feature shares perspectives on the museum's development based upon the personalities of Peg Lamont, the first President of the Museum Board, Ellsworth Brown, an early Director of the Museum, and Helen Bergh, the Museum's first Curator of Education. The exhibit was curated by Lora Schaunaman and Marianne Marttila-Klipfel and was Lora's last big exhibit of her 20 year career at the DPM, a great legacy of many beautiful displays.

**July:** Taking advantage of summer weather and outside fresh air, two weeks of reduced enrollment art camp were held at Centennial Village.

**October:** The exhibits and education departments collaborated to create an outdoor, social distance friendly event in the fall. Education staff made activity bags. The exhibits department created a 'take and go' Main Street Scavenger Hunt kit. Settings for photos, decorations, and "treats to go" rounded out the festivities.

## **COVID19 GLOBAL PANDEMIC**

# How to weather a pandemic

We had our last "normal" open day on Friday, March 13 and reopened to a new "normal" on Wednesday, July 8 (about four months). As a county-supported museum, we had a safety net that we did not take for granted. We also did not sit around and wring our hands. We immediately switched lanes and got to work reaching our museum families, patrons and community.

Straightaway we increased our social media presence. Do not underestimate the power of electronic entertainment, especially when everyone was quarantining and schooling and working from home. We posted artifact stories, had fun with our exhibits with April Fools – find the out-of-place object, and history trivia with archival photos of Brown County; we increased our social media output by 500%.

Next, we started producing videos, over 20 of them. We have upped our AV game, a good digital camcorder, lav mics, lighting; we can produce quality content on a budget. Our videos included, Facebook live exhibit tours, educational programming from our 3<sup>rd</sup> grade South Dakota history lessons, "Coffee with Friends" video chats with local historians about interesting topics. Wondering how to make butter? Check out our YouTube channel.

We have an annual All Dakota High School Fine Arts Exhibition in April that draws over 15 schools and 150 students from both North and South Dakota for two days of art workshops and curated judging sessions for 8-12 graders. Awards are given in 10 different media categories with a Best in Show prize selected by two professional artist/judges. This year it became a virtual competition and was shared via YouTube with our high school art teachers. We are pretty sure we had the only High School art event all spring in South Dakota.

As we made plans to reopen, we thought about how we could still provide educational enrichment in the interim and safely reintroduce the public to our building. Staff proposed conducting limited tours both in the exhibits and on Main Street. One staff person and nine participants took part in one exhibit tour in June and five downtown tours. This helped us maintain contact with our patrons and community in a fresh way that was well-received and well-attended. It gave us a good practice run for a limited reopening later in the summer.

Our regular summer camps were not feasible this year so we switched to a modified, greatly reduced art camp at Centennial Village, taking in only 9 campers per session instead of the usual 15-18 and cancelled our history camp altogether. To replace and supplement this annual summer tradition of interaction with our museum families, staff created history packets and art kits to distribute to families for 9 weeks, every Monday in June and July. We use our online reservation site for families to "reserve" packets. Each history packet had a theme and a scavenger hunt, and each art kit had an instruction sheet and supplies. We en-

couraged families to send pictures of the projects and scavenger hunts for us to post on our social media. It was well received and we handed out over 1200 history packets and about 900 art kits and serviced about 60-80 families each week.

Going forward we are open with new hours; in July we started with staff only at the front desk and in August we welcomed back our volunteers as they were comfortable. We have implemented many changes: One-way traffic, frequent hand sanitizer stations, complementary masks and other ways to make our staff, volunteers and guests feel safe. Our mascot, Buster the Bison, helps guests follow Buster's Trail through the museum exhibits in one direction with fun little tidbits and posters. We are trying to make everything fun even though everything "normal" has changed. We may not be the same Museum that we closed in March but we reopened a better, safer, more innovative Museum, still committed to our community and our mission of telling the stories of the people of Brown County and the Dakota prairie.
